1. Introduction

- 1.1 The European Habitats Directive¹ and Wild Birds Directive² provide protection for sites that are of exceptional importance in respect of rare, endangered or vulnerable natural habitats and species. The network consists of Special Areas of Conservation (SACs) and Special Protection Areas (SPAs). Both types can also be referred to as European Sites. The National Planning Policy Framework (NPPF) also states that Ramsar sites should be afforded the same level of protection as the European sites.
- 1.2 The requirement to undertake Habitats Regulation Assessment (HRA) of development plans is set out in the Conservation of Habitats and Species Regulations (2017) (as amended). It is also a requirement of Regulation 32 schedule 2 of the Neighbourhood Planning Regulations 2012 (as amended). In order to proceed to referendum a Neighbourhood Plan must meet a series of 'basic conditions', which include that it does not breach, and is otherwise compatible with, EU obligations.
- 1.3 Regulation 105 of the Conservation of Habitats and Species Regulations (2017) states:

'Where a land use plan:

- (a) Is likely to have a significant effect on a European sites or a European offshore marine site (either alone or in combination with other plans or projects), and
- (b) Is not directly connected with or necessary to the management of the site,

The plan-making authority for that plan must, before the plan is given effect, make an appropriate assessment of the implications for the site in view of that site's conservation objectives.'

1.4 The HRA is therefore undertaken in stages and should conclude whether or not a proposal or policy in the Plan would adversely affect the integrity of any sites.

Stage 1: Determining whether a plan is likely to have a significant effect on a European site. This needs to take account of the likely impacts in combination with other relevant plans and projects. This assessment should be made using the precautionary principle. The screening assessment must reflect the outcomes of the 2018 judgement of the Court of Justice of the European Union³, which has ruled that where mitigation is necessary this must be identified through an Appropriate Assessment.

Stage 2: Carrying out Appropriate Assessment and ascertaining the effect on site integrity. The effects of the plan on the conservation objectives of sites should be assessed, to ascertain whether the plan has an adverse effect on the integrity of a European site.

Stage 3: Identifying mitigation measures and alternative solutions. The aim of this stage is to find ways of avoiding or significantly reducing adverse impacts, so that site integrity is no longer at risk. If there are still likely to be negative impacts, the option should be dropped, unless exceptionally it can be justified by imperative reasons of overriding public interest.

- 1.5 The Bredfield Neighbourhood Plan is being produced by Bredfield Parish Council. This report considers whether there are likely to be significant effects on protected European sites and where a full Appropriate Assessment may be required. Where Appropriate Assessment is identified as necessary, this has been carried out.
- The Bredfield Neighbourhood Plan will need to be in general conformity with the strategic policies of the Local Plan. The adopted Local Plan is currently the Core Strategy and Development Management Policies (2013), the Site Allocations and Area Specific Policies DPD (2017) and saved policies contained in the Local Plan (2001), however a new Local Plan for the Suffolk Coastal area of East Suffolk is currently being prepared and is well advanced. The Bredfield Neighbourhood Plan is therefore being developed within the

context of the relevant policies contained in the emerging Suffolk Coastal Local Plan (the Suffolk Coastal Final Draft Local Plan, January 2019).

1.7 The emerging Suffolk Coastal Local Plan has been subject to Habitats Regulations Assessment as part of its production. Where screening identified a likely significant effect, an Appropriate Assessment was undertaken and mitigation measures identified were incorporated within the Final Draft Local Plan, resulting in a conclusion that the plan will not lead to any adverse effects on European wildlife sites within and in the vicinity of the (then) Suffolk Coastal District. The 2013 Core Strategy was also previously subject to strategic level Appropriate Assessment which concluded that without mitigation there would be a significant effect on Natura 2000 sites, alone and in combination with other plans. The Appropriate Assessment identified recreational disturbance particularly from dog walkers as the main significant effect. The Council has subsequently undertaken to produce a Recreational Avoidance and Mitigation Strategy and requires payment towards mitigation from residential developments within 13km of the protected European sites.

2. Protected sites covered by this report

2.1 Sites included in this assessment are listed in Table 1. This includes all sites that are within 20km of the Bredfield Neighbourhood Plan area (for consistency with the distances applied within the HRA of the emerging Suffolk Coastal Local Plan and adopting the precautionary approach). The locations of the sites are shown on maps in Appendix 2 and the Qualifying Features and Conservation Objectives of the sites are contained in Appendix 3, along with a summary of the pressures and threats as documented in the Appropriate Assessment for the Final Draft Local Plan.

3. Bredfield Neighbourhood Plan

- 3.1 Bredfield Parish Council is producing a Neighbourhood Plan for Bredfield, in order to set out the vision, objectives and policies for the development of the parish up to 2036, within the context of the emerging Suffolk Coastal Local Plan. This HRA report reviews the Bredfield Neighbourhood Plan (Submission version).
- 3.2 The Neighbourhood Plan includes a range of policies covering the Bredfield Neighbourhood Plan area. A number of polices relate to the full Neighbourhood Plan area whilst others are area/location specific. The Plan allocates three specific sites for new housing development (Policy BDP 15 Sites for Development).
- 3.3 The policies in the Bredfield Neighbourhood Plan are listed in Table 2 below. An assessment of whether each policy is likely to have a significant effect on European protected sites is included in section 5 of this report.

4. Other Plans and Projects

- 4.1 Regulation 105 of the 2017 Regulations requires consideration to be given to whether a Plan will have an effect either alone or in combination with other plans or projects.
- 4.2 As noted in the introduction, the other key plan is the Local Plan. The emerging Local Plan is well advanced, and was submitted for Examination in March 2019. Until the adoption of the new Local Plan, the adopted Core Strategy and Development Management Policies (2013) and Site Allocations and Area Specific Policies DPD (2017) also contain relevant policies. The emerging Local Plan sets out the broad scale and distribution of development across the area of East Suffolk formerly covered by Suffolk Coastal District. This has been subject to an Appropriate Assessment as part of its production. The current adopted plan is the Core Strategy and Development Management Policies 2013 which was adopted in July 2013 and was subject to a strategic level appropriate assessment. The currently adopted Site Allocations and Area Specific Strategies DPD (2017) implements the policies and development strategy set out in the Core Strategy.
- 4.5 The Bredfield Neighbourhood Plan policies interpret the strategy and policies of the emerging Local Plan at a local level. The policies contained in the Draft Bredfield Neighbourhood Plan are proposed to provide locally specific, criteria based policy guidance for the determination of planning applications.
- 4.6 Policy SCLP12.1 of the emerging Local Plan provides an indicative minimum housing figure of 20 to the Bredfield Neighbourhood Plan area for the period 2018 2036. The Bredfield Neighbourhood Plan identified three sites to deliver this housing requirement. The allocated sites have potential to deliver up to 30 new homes. On the allocations (for 10 units) has outline planning permission.

- 4.7 A screening process has considered each policy in the emerging Suffolk Coastal Local Plan and concluded whether significant effects are likely and that an Appropriate Assessment is needed. The Appropriate Assessment of has subsequently considered the following themes recreation pressure from new residential development, recreation pressure from tourism, urbanisation effects in close proximity, air quality from increased road traffic, water quality and resources and biodiversity net gain. Mitigation measures were identified within the Appropriate Assessment and were incorporated within the Final Draft Local Plan, resulting in a conclusion that the plan will not lead to any adverse effects on European wildlife sites within and in the vicinity of the (then) Suffolk Coastal District.
- 4.8 The 2013 Core Strategy was also previously subject to strategic level Appropriate Assessment which concluded that without mitigation there would be a significant effect on Natura 2000 sites, alone and in combination with other plans. The Appropriate Assessment identified recreational disturbance particularly from dog walkers as the main significant effect. The Council has subsequently undertaken to produce a Recreational Avoidance and Mitigation Strategy and requires payment towards mitigation of significant effects from residential developments within 13km of the protected European sites.

5. Assessment of likely effects of the Bredfield Neighbourhood Plan on European protected sites

Table 3 below considers each policy of the Bredfield Neighbourhood Plan in relation to whether there is potential for a likely significant effect on protected European sites. This constitutes Stage 1 as set out under paragraph 1.4 above. Consideration is given to the characteristics and location of the protected sites. The policies are considered within the context of the Local Plan policies which they must be in general conformity with and which have themselves been subject to Habitats Regulations Assessment, as set out in section 4 above.

6. Appropriate Assessment

- 6.1 The screening for likely significant effects (table 3) has identified one policy (policy BDP 15) for more in-depth consideration within an appropriate assessment. Once a likely significant effect has been identified, the purpose of the appropriate assessment is to examine evidence and information in more detail to establish the nature and extent of the predicted impacts, in order to answer the question as to whether such impacts could lead to adverse effects on European site integrity. Competent authorities should have enough evidence to satisfy themselves that there are feasible measures to prevent adverse effects.
- As set out in table 3 above, Policy BDP 15 of the Bredfield Neighbourhood Plan has been identified as having a potential likely significant effect on protected European Sites from increased recreational disturbance as the result of population growth arising from increased residential development.
- 6.3 Policy BDP 15 identifies three sites for new residential development and sets out a number of criteria to guide development on those sites. All three sites are identified for a maximum of 10 dwellings, with one of the allocated sites already granted planning permission.
- 6.4 All three sites fall within the 13km Zone of Influence (as set out in the Recreational Avoidance and Mitigation Strategy- see below for further information) but are not considered to be in close proximity to any protected European wildlife sites (within 400m).
- 6.5 The impact of increased recreation on the coastal and heathland European wildlife sites has already been recognised in Local Plan HRA work. This has led to collaborative working between the five Suffolk local planning authorities that lie within 13km of the coastal and heathland European sites. Taking a strategic approach to the European site mitigation has resulted in the development of the Suffolk Coast HRA Recreational Disturbance Avoidance and Mitigation Strategy (RAMS).
- 6.6 The RAM Strategy is a means by which sustainable housing growth can be delivered, whilst adequately protecting Suffolk's coastal, estuarine and heathland European wildlife sites. It is being developed as a strategy that

provides a tariff based solution to mitigating the additional recreation pressure risks associated with new development. The RAMS sets out an integrated suite of avoidance and mitigation measures that are supported by comprehensive evidence and experience gained from other European site mitigation strategies.

- 6.7 The RAM Strategy has initially been developed on the basis of the housing numbers and spatial distribution set out in the existing local plans for each of the local planning authorities. However, as confirmed by the conclusions of the HRA of the emerging Local Plan, the RAM Strategy is considered capable of accommodating and mitigating the impact of the levels of residential growth being promoted through the emerging Local Plan (which the Bredfield Neighbourhood Plan is considered to be in general conformity with).
- 6.8 Policies within the Local Plan relating to the delivery of the RAM Strategy are considered to adequately enable appropriate mitigation for the recreation impacts arising from new residential development.

7. Summary and conclusions

- 7.1 The Bredfield Neighbourhood Plan will provide policies which will be used for determining planning applications alongside the Suffolk Coastal Local Plan. It includes locally specific criteria based policies to be used for the determination of planning applications, including the identification of important local views to be protected, locally significant heritage assets, and an amended settlement boundary. The Plan also includes three allocations for new residential development (one of which already has planning permission).
- 7.2 The Neighbourhood Plan is being prepared to be in general conformity with the relevant policies in the emerging Suffolk Coastal Local Plan, and also considers the relevant policies of the currently adopted Core Strategy and Development Management Policies Document (2013) and the Site Allocations and Area Specific Policies DPD (2017).
- 7.3 Policy BD15 of the Bredfield Neighbourhood Plan has been identified through the HRA screening process as having a potential likely significant effect on protected European wildlife sites as the result of increased recreational disturbance. However, as confirmed through the HRA of the emerging Local Plan, the Suffolk Coast HRA Recreational Disturbance Avoidance and Mitigation Strategy provides adequate measures to mitigate this impact and therefore enable a conclusion that the Bredfield Neighbourhood Plan will not lead to any adverse effects on protected European sites.






Appendix 2: Locations of European protected sites
