

FROM OUR MINISTRY TEAM

You can tell that Easter is coming, as the supermarket shelves are stacked with hot cross buns and chocolate Easter eggs. When it comes to Easter eggs, what type is your favourite? Do you like Cadbury's cream eggs, sugar coated mini eggs, Malteser eggs or chocolate bunnies?

Hot cross buns and Easter eggs have long been associated with the Easter hope because of the messages that they convey and the new life that they represent.

As you bite into your hot cross bun, think about all that it signifies. Marked with a cross on the top, and traditionally eaten on Good Friday, the cross reminds us of Jesus crucifixion and death, dying for our sins. The orange peel similarly indicates the bitterness of Jesus death on the Cross, and the spices signify of the spices used to embalm his body.

In the same way, eggs have long been associated with Easter hope by the way that they suggest new life. Although there is no reference in the Bible to any kind of egg, the custom goes back to the early days of Christianity, with the egg symbolising new life and the empty tomb from which Jesus was resurrected. Christians adopted the tradition of dyeing or painting eggs, and from this custom commercialised chocolate eggs (often hollow inside) were later created.

Christian hope is found not in an egg shell but in the empty tomb, and the miracle of Easter is at the centre of the Christian faith. The empty shell of a boiled egg, or an egg from a chick that has hatched, is a powerful reminder of Jesus' empty tomb.

This Spring, it is impossible to buy free range eggs because of Avian Flu, and all birds must be kept in sheds to protect them from this fatal

disease. What a reminder this is of the fragility of our natural world, as well as our fragile and broken nature of humanity! Yet Christians know that because of the physical resurrection of Jesus, we have an unshakeable hope, whatever we are facing personally or globally.

What does Easter mean to you? We have heard the story so many times that it can lose its impact. So, as you eat a chocolate Easter egg, with an empty and hollow centre, think about the empty tomb and miracle of the resurrection.

I do hope that you can join us for our Easter services as we think more and celebrate the miracle of the Resurrection.

- Palm Sunday, 2nd April: We remember Jesus' journey to the Cross, beginning with a procession from the Village Hall (starting at 10am) to the Church.
- Good Friday, 7th April: We focus on Jesus' death on Good Friday with an 'Hour at the Cross' service of music, readings and reflections (starting at 2pm).
- On Easter Saturday, 8th April: join us we have an amazing Easter Egg hunt around the churchyard. All welcome!
- On Easter Sunday, 9th April: Come and celebrate Jesus' resurrection (10am) in the church.

As you bite into your hot cross bun or Easter egg, think about the unshakeable hope that we have because of Easter.

Dear Bredfield,

Tonya, Maks and Katya have made the difficult decision to go back to Ukraine to be with their father/husband. They will always be grateful for the kindness shown to them by the village. They were offered a home by a lovely family in Ufford and we are grateful that they had a choice to make. We pray for their safety.

With the generous donations made just before Christmas which totalled an incredible £1661, we were able to buy 7 inverters, kindly sourced at cost by Ollie Taylor of Ivy Solar who very kindly topped up the funds to ensure we could buy 7 not 6. Dave, a resident of Hadleigh, makes regular trips to Ukraine to take supplies and has taken the inverters free of charge.

Thank you to all those who supported with donations for the inverters, clothes for the family, lifts into Woodbridge and Ipswich, helped finding work and offered cups of tea and conversation.

Why this project, why now?

Since first finding our home here in 2016, I have been fascinated with both the history of our house and village life. More recently I have been wondering how I can increase my contribution to community life and assist the village recorder, Ann Pilgrim, to capture significant information about our village and us as its inhabitants.

The concept of this resulting project is to invite all in Bredfield to share information about our village and our relationship to it (history social, historical, topographical etc.), including aspects of our homes or workplaces in Bredfield – essentially sharing in the present to uncover the past in a pictorial and digitalized record, and with potential for replication across neighbouring villages.

So, fellow Bredfieldiers - hunt out your photos, write a simple short story and email them to the dedicated email address below. The umbrella project name (We Live Here: Bredfield) will head up two or three small, formulated photobased and theme-led activities across the year, which together build a bigger picture and narrative as shared by us as community inhabitants.

And an example of the story.......
Kev and I moved into <u>Aster Cottage</u> in November 2016. We had spent a lot of time in Suffolk over 20 plus years prior to this and had been searching for the right place for us both for most of 2015. We both still worked full time – Kev in Colchester and me in North London - and so could only enjoy Aster and Bredfield



at weekends or in holiday time. Leaving on Sundays became more and more difficult. When the first Covid lock down caused us to pull out from a planned holiday in March 2020, and our work became remote/furloughed, we hunkered down at Aster and happily made this our home serendipitously sooner than we had expected.

When we first arrived, it seemed that every service we needed to make to the house was that same price! The cooker cleaned? £50. The chimney swept? £50. The alarm serviced? £50! Those days have definitely disappeared! And since 2016, the changes we've made have been mostly to the garden, general decoration, including the external colour of the house, replacement of the soffits and facias and some additional secondary glazing of some of the windows.

The World Federation of Music Therapy launched the World Music Therapy Awareness Day in 2016 to celebrate music's ability to heal people. Music Therapy can address physical, emotional, cognitive and social needs for people with disabilities or mental issues.

In the history of humanity music has always held a crucial place; 5,000 BC the Egyptian priest-physicians were using it for healing purposes and in 400 BC Hippocrates was playing music to his patients. In fact, numerous cultures globally such as native doctors and shamans use incantations, musical chants and dances to cure people. Possibly because music provides a total brain workout, just listening to music can reduce anxiety, blood pressure and pain; as well as improve sleep quality, mood, mental alertness and memory.

Since the 20th century Music Therapy has been widely recognized as an established psychological clinical intervention and is especially

effective for those who have difficulty communicating verbally. Although music transcends all backgrounds and all ages, it has been found to provide (in Britain at least) that extra supportive interaction to help babies bond with their parents or to help those who feel isolated for example the elderly with dementia.

To some ways my window display is an extension of the brain workout having a 1970's psychedelic feel backdrop and various combinations of diverse instruments. The Monkey/Raven Hawaiian Guitar duo, the Dog Tamborine groovy guy, The Bunny Percussion Panpipes/Triangle twins, the Sheep Australian Digerdoo duo and finally the Foxy Bodhrán Drum brush basher- Boom Boom!

IMPORTANT – VOTER ID REQUIREMENT

The Government has introduced a requirement for voters to show photo ID when voting at a polling station at some elections.

This new requirement will apply for the first time at the local elections (which include East Suffolk) taking place on Thursday 4 May 2023.

This will require voters to produce a form of photo ID – you will be able to use any of the following –

- Passport
- Photocard Driving Licence
- Identity card with PASS mark (Proof of Age Standard Scheme)
- Biometric immigration document
- Force's identity card
- Certain concessionary travel card
- Blue badge card
- Certain national identity cards

If you don't have an accepted photo form of ID – or if you doubt that your photo still looks like you, you can apply for a Voter Authority Certificate. You can apply for this on-line at : voter-authority-certificate.service.gov.uk

Alternatively, you can complete a paper application form and send this to the electoral services team at your local council.
