FROM OUR MINISTRY TEAM

Discovering God and sharing the love of Jesus

For over 500 years, St Andrew's Church, with its lovely bell tower and tranquil churchyard shaded by ancient lime trees, has been a place of Christian worship and has sought to be the cornerstone of our village community here in Bredfield.

The church is more than a building. The Bible tells us that the church is the people of God seeking to follow Christ and serve their community through prayer and practical support. That is what St Andrew's seeks to be as a church congregation.

Over the last few months, since the beginning of January, we have spent time praying about and considering what we believe God's plans and vision are for St Andrew's for the coming years. There were times of prayer, reflection, and consultation running up to our Annual Church Meeting in April.

We believe that our '**Purpose'**, explaining why we exist as a Benefice, is "Discovering God and sharing the love of Jesus". We can all discover God, more of God, and go deeper in our faith wherever we are on our journey of faith, and whether or not we are a member of St Andrew's.

It is also rooted in the belief that God wants to do, and is indeed doing, a 'new thing' (Isaiah 43:19) in us and through us as a church and in Bredfield.

As St Andrew's has been a place of Christian worship and prayer since the 14th Century, so we continue to be an active place of worship and seek to serve our village community today. We would love to welcome you to any of our services or activities and be assured that there is always a warm welcome.

I always love meeting everyone at the village shop (where there is great fresh local produce especially at this time of year) and other events, as well as on Sundays at the church services. In May we had a wonderful Rogation Walk around a section of the parish boundary, 'beating the bounds', and it was really good to walk and meet with a wide diversity of people from the village and beyond.

At the beginning of this month, I am very much looking forward to the Bredfield Church Fete on Saturday 3rd June. Thank you to all of those who help to organise or contribute to this great event in any way. I look forward to seeing you and meeting you then.

BREDFIELD TOWNLANDS CHARITY

A small charity, Bredfield Town Lands, originally established as a church charity in the early nineteenth century, exists in the parish. There are five trustees, drawn from people in the village.

The original purpose was to support the poor of the village and was administered by the Vicar and Churchwardens. Today the charity has a wider remit to allow grants to projects which will be for the benefit of the people of the village. This has meant that in the recent past, we have supported several local projects, particularly the village hall, with financial contributions to help them achieve their aim. We still have the original remit, to support people living in the parish of Bredfield who are in need, hardship, or distress.

The Coronation

Coronation Celebrations – Ringing for the King

St Andrew's bellringers took part in the Coronation Celebrations on Saturday 6 May, joining about 100 other friends and neighbours to watch the ceremony from Westminster Abbey on the big screen in the Village Hall. At the end of the service, as King Charles and Queen Camilla reached the West Door of Westminster Abbey to begin their triumphal procession back to Buckingham Palace, the ten bells of the Abbey began to peal out, and this was the cue for our ringers to dash over to St Andrew's and proclaim the fact to Bredfield.

We couldn't hope to emulate the Abbey ringers, who launched into a peal of 5040 changes of Cambridge Surprise Royal lasting 3 hours and 23 minutes. Here in Bredfield, eleven of us rang the changes called "Kings and Queens", then Plain Hunt Minor and Plain Bob Doubles, for about half an hour, joining over 4500 other bands of ringers around the world to commemorate the Coronation by Ringing for the King.

Bredfield's ringers were: Trevor Boyd, Chris Woods, Yvonne Woods, Ann Pilgrim, Elizabeth Smith, Alan Steventon, Terry Smith, Vince Buckman, Shirley Hovell, Iain Whyte and Mike Pilgrim Some of us learnt to ring as teenagers, more years ago than we care to admit, but Chris, Yvonne, Elizabeth and Terry only started learning last year, when we started up again after Covid. Well done everybody! We then returned to the Village Hall to join in a sumptuous Bring and Share lunch, and spend the afternoon chatting to friends and neighbours.

We rang again on Sunday morning, for the special Coronation Celebration service at St Andrew's.

Beating the Bounds Walk 2023

It is 20 years since the tradition of Beating the Bounds in Bredfield was revived and it was great to continue this annual walk with a record number of 32 walkers from both Bredfield and Woodbridge. In the days before maps, it was the custom for Parishioners to walk the Parish boundaries at Rogationtide to ensure that all knew where the boundary lay and to make repairs as necessary. Rogationtide is the days leading up to Ascension Day (this year May 18th) and comes from the latin 'rogare' meaning 'to ask' as it was the custom to ask God's blessing on the crops and livestock and on all who tend these. This year, the clouds lifted and we enjoyed a sunny 4-mile walk out to, then along, the Parish boundary adjoining Hasketon and Boulge, stopping along the way at points of interest before heading back to St Andrew's Churchyard for a welcome cup of tea and cake.

FETE NIGHT JUNE 2023



This year I thought the Bredfield Church Fete deserved a window display all its own, but I did not want it to be set in daytime, because the actual Church Fete covers that aspect perfectly. Therefore to add a bit of drama, the display is supposed to symbolise night time, when the British wildlife and animals begin to explore the strange temporary environment left after the hustling and bustling Church Fete.

The Fox and Badger take advantage of the remaining crumbs from the

Cake Stall. The Black Labrador Retriever has a go on the Hook-A-Duck game (minus the official Fishing Rod of course!). The Hedgehog is enticed by the lantern light while the Rabbits are equally curious of the Coconut Shy... not being aware of the watchful Owl atop one of the poles! And for those keen of eye, they can perhaps spot the cheeky Squirrel awaiting its opportunity to take and bury these gigantic nuts for the Winter larder!

The Fate of Fetes? Originally the word fete came from the French fête, meaning 'Holiday' or 'Festival' and seems to be quite a modern event,

compared with the traditional Fairs founded in the Middle Ages. Although the early Fetes possibly grew out of `sales of work' where the ladies of the parish made items to be sold for charitable causes, such as war veterans or orphans. Officially the heyday of the Fete is attributed to the 1950's when it featured heavily in contemporary works of fiction, interest declining during the 70's-80's and now making a comeback; mainly for residents to strengthen their sense of community and charitable fundraising. In fact, there is a specific delineation between Church and Village Fetes. The Village Fete being usually held on a Village Green or Open Community Area and raising money for the benefit of the community or other local cause. The Church Fete, like its title, is concerned with raising money for the Church and usually held either on Church Grounds or at the Vicarage. Well, Bredfield Church Fete certainly falls into the latter definition with its generous Vicarage host, garden area and traditional games/stalls!

Talking of traditional games, you might be curious about the history of the Coconut Shy like myself? Again it seems history is a little undecided on who has the claim to the game; The Showmans Guild quote describes the coconut shies beginning at the <u>Cambridge Midsummer Fair</u> with cockerels as the targets rather than coconuts – a somewhat disturbing practice, especially for the cockerels! The Surrey Comet Newspaper wrote an article "for the small sum of one penny, you could have three throws with sticks with the prospect of getting a cocoa nut..." at the `Pleasure Fair' in Kingston Upon Thames 1867 (the Fair taking place of course conveniently near a commercial coconut fibre mill). And finally, The National Fairground Archive Coconut Shy photographed in 1890.

By the way... the word "shy" in this context means to toss or throw and although websites state that in late 19th - early 20th Century coconuts were seen as an exotic prize – I get the impression they still are, so partially the reason the dear old Coconut Shy is being less played today.
